Disgusted with the lousy play of his ballclub, George Steinbrenner pulled the plug on Bob Lemon's first 133 games as the Yankees manager on June 18th following a brief road trip. New York was in fourth place with a 34-31 record and eight games out of first place. Back in the saddle when the Yanks arrived back home to open a series with Toronto was Billy Martin for his second of five separate tours as Yankee skipper. Lemon had replaced Martin during the 1978 season with Steinbrenner's plan to return Martin to the dugout in 1980. Some of the players weren't exactly overjoyed to see Martin back with the team, but they were 55-40 (.585) under Billy and never moved out of fourth... "Mr. October," Reggie Jackson, who had had his share of run-ins with Martin, perhaps the most disgruntled of the players, led the team with 29 home runs and 89 RBI. New York hit .266 and 150 homers during the year... Tommy John tied the Brothers Niekro (Phil and Joe) for the second-most wins in the big leagues (21). Ron Guidry, who spent some time as a closer-in-a-pinch after an injury to "Goose" Gossage, finished tied with three others for the sixth-most victories (18) and fifth in strikeouts (201). "Gator" was third in ERA and John fifth. Overall, the Yankee pitching corps was second in the A. L. in ERA (3.83)... A great historical era of Yankee baseball ended with the tragic death of team captain Thurman Munson in a plane crash, August 2nd. Munson had recently received his multi-engine pilot's license and was practicing takeoffs and landings in his private jet at an airport near his home in Canton, Ohio. In order to spend more time with his family during the season, Munson had taken up flying to travel between New York and Canton. During an approach for landing, the heart-and-soul of the Yankees failed to lower the jet's flaps which provide lift for the wings at slow speeds. The jet was too close to the ground to recover as he applied more engine power, resulting in the fatal accident. Munson was trapped inside the aircraft after it burst on fire. He received a ten minute standing ovation from over 51,000 fans at Yankee Stadium prior to that evening's game.
