As a 19-year-old in 1970, Cesar Cedeno came to the big leagues with the "five tools" everyone raves about. His career was off to a fabulous start until 1974. He suffered through a personal tragedy between the 1973-74 seasons in his native Dominican Republic, and starting with the '74 campaign, his remarkable abilities appeared to be on a puzzling decline. His personal statistics were good, but they did not remain at his previously superior level. In 1978 his season was cut short due to a knee injury. He contracted hepatitis in 1979 which further diminished his talents even more. He played more games at first base than his usual centerfield spot in '79, drove in 54 runs, and stole thirty bases in 132 games...Jose Cruz's nine home runs and 72 RBI were the most on the ball club. Twenty-two-year-old Terry Puhl fit in nicely with his team-leading 172 base hits and 87 runs scored...The pitching staff posted the most complete games in the N. L. (55) and the most shutouts (17). James Rodney Richard, 6 feet 8 inches tall, blew away the competition with his major league-best 313 strikeouts, 9.6 K's per nine innings, and ERA. He completed 19 ballgames. Joe Niekro and his knuckleball won 18 contests and tied brother Phil (ATL) for the most wins in the N. L. (21). The staff ERA (3.20) was the league's second-best...Despite hitting a crooked-looking 49 homers and 58 triples AS A TEAM during the season, the Astros spent a majority of the year in first place of the N. L. West. (Their biggest lead was 10 ½ games on July 4th.) They were up by a half-game over the Reds, September 10th, before two back-to-back losses in Cincinnati dropped them to second for the rest of the schedule. The year ended with Houston 1 ½ games out of first. They beat the Reds in their season series, 10-8.
