The 1979 Pirates, in retrospect, were a team that was MEANT to be together. With team captain Willie "Pops" Stargell showing them the way, and manager Chuck Tanner maintaining strong, fatherly control of his charges, the Buccos experienced the usual ups-and-downs during a long season but the two aforementioned gentlemen kept the ship together. The team was in fourth place and five games out on June 15th before they kicked off a mini five-game winning streak which boosted them into second. At the All Star break, they were back in fourth but in the midst of a nine-game winning streak which elevated them up to second and serious contention with Montreal the rest of the year. A blistering .675 winning percentage (52-25) in the season's latter half assured the NL East crown by two slim games over the Expos...The Pirates outscored the Reds 15-5 and swept the NLCS, 3-0; two games went extra-innings...During the season, "Captain Willie" Stargell and the team adopted one of the hottest dance songs that summer ("We Are Family" by Sister Sledge) as their theme song which described their brotherly togetherness and helped carry them into the World Series against Baltimore. After Game Four in Pittsburgh, the Bucs were down three-games-to-one. Becoming one of six teams in the 20th Century to accomplish a feat highly stacked against them, a literal cannon-fire barrage saw the Pirates knock out 33 hits and score 15 runs in the final three games (scores of 7-1, 4-0, and 4-1) to topple the Orioles, the last on Memorial Stadium's green grass. There was no doubt about the Series MVP: Stargell hit .400, three home runs, and drove in seven...Willie had also claimed the NLCS MVP award and shared the National League MVP with the Cardinals' Keith Hernandez...As a team, the Pirates hit .272 and 148 home runs during the

year. Both placed them second in the N. L. In only 424 AB, Stargell, 39, mashed 32 homers to lead the team; he drove home 82. Dave Parker, 28, clobbered 25 jacks and garnered the most RBI (94). Whippet Omar Moreno led the league in stolen bases and the Bucs with 196 base hits and 110 runs scored. Six pitchers with double-digit victories won 71 of the Pirates' games: John Candelaria (14), Bruce Kison (13), Bert Blyleven (172 K's) and Jim Bibby (both 12), and relievers Kent Tekulve and Enrique Romo (both 10). The staff ERA (3.41) placed them third in the N. L. while they compiled the most saves (52).
