The Expos and Pirates spent the Summer of '79 swapping positions between first and second of the NL East. Montreal was tied or held the lead for 100 calendar days during the season, the latest day being September 24th. The Expos slipped to second for the remainder of the schedule after losing, 10-4, to the Pirates in Pittsburgh, September 25th. The Bucs won again the next day to go up by 1 ½ games. Montreal then closed out the season at Olympic Stadium in a weekend series against the Phillies. Philadelphia won two of the three games to wind down the campaign. Meanwhile, the Pirates WON two of their last three over the Cardinals to capture the division by two games. The Expos won seven of the eighteen games versus Pittsburgh during the regular season...Montreal slammed 143 home runs for the year bolstered by Larry Parrish's thirty. Twenty-four-year-old Andre Dawson had a breakout season after hitting 25 homers, 12 triples, and 24 doubles. He led the ballclub with 92 RBI and 90 runs scored. Gary Carter, who added 22 jacks, was joined by Ellis Valentine's 21 and Tony Perez's 13. Both Parrish and Valentine drove in 82 runs. The team hit .264 overall, fifth in the league...The Expos pitching staff, with the league's best ERA (3.14), counted SIX double-digit winners. Bill Lee won 16 games while Steve Rogers garnered 13 victories. Four hurlers all won ten games: Dan Schatzeder, Ross Grimsley, David Palmer, and Rudy May. Rogers led the group with 143 strikeouts...Montreal scored 701 runs and allowed 581...Tim Raines debuted as a pinch-runner against the Cubs, September 11th in Montreal.
