The Reds franchise began a time of earnest transition prior to the start of the 1979 season: Pete Rose, seeking a huge payout, "Got Paid" by the Phillies to the tune of a four-year \$3.2 million contract, the largest outpouring of cash for any athlete in any sport at that time. He left as an unrestricted free agent. The Reds also hired a new General Manager after Bob Howsam, who had been the genius behind the "Big Red Machine" of the early to mid '70s, retired after 12 years at the helm. Enter Dick Wagner, an executive who followed Howsam to Cincinnati from St. Louis in the late 60s and had been working in the Reds front office (mainly marketing) since that time. Believing the ballclub needed a shake-up, Wagner cut loose manager "Sparky" Anderson who refused to make changes to his coaching staff. Missing the play-offs in 1977 and 1978 to the Dodgers may have strongly influenced Wagner's feelings as well...John McNamara was installed as the team's new field commander and guided the ballclub to a first place finish in his first year...George Foster led the team with 30 HR and 98 RBI. With Rose's departure, Dan Driessen became a major part of the offense. He hit 18 jacks and drove home 75 runs. Johnny Bench, now 31, cracked 22 homers and tallied 80 RBI. In 127 games, 35-year-old Joe Morgan, in his last season wearing a Reds uniform, added 9 home runs and 32 RBI. Ray Knight ended the year third in the league in batting average. The team hit .264 and 132 homers, both marks fifth in the N. L....Thirty-four-year-old Tom Seaver turned in a solid season with a team-high 16 wins, 131 strikeouts, and 9 complete games. Youngster Mike LaCoss completed the year with 14 victories. The staff ERA was fourth in the N. L. (3.58)...The Pirates bounced the Reds from the post-season in three straight games, the first time in four tries during the 70s the Bucs conquered Cincinnati for the N. L. pennant. The Reds were 8-4 against Pittsburgh during the regular season.
