Befitting the history of past seasons, the Dodgers and Giants (along with the upstart Pirates) played a summer of exciting pre-expansion baseball with those three ballclubs vying for the top of the National League. The defending World Champion Dodgers, on the strength of a consecutive eight-game September winning streak, still had to go to the last game of the season--a win on the road in a doubleheader split with the Phillies--to head back to the Fall Classic. L. A. won the pennant by 1 ½ games over San Francisco, a team they played to a 9-9 draw during their regular season series. The Dodgers split their 18 season meetings with the Pirates as well...Sandy Koufax, who early in his career threw hard but was frustratingly inconsistent finding the strike zone, turned his career completely around starting in 1961 while dealing with a an excruciatingly painful arthritic left elbow. In his final six seasons, he won 129 games, struck out 1,713 batters in 1,377 innings, won three Cy Young Awards, and an MVP trophy. He retired following the World Series after leading major league pitchers with 27 wins, 317 K's, a 1.73 ERA, 27 complete games, 5 shutouts, and his last Cy Young. He was second to Roberto Clemente in MVP voting. Koufax spearheaded a Dodger pitching staff that topped the N. L. in all major categories, including ERA (2.62), the latter the best in baseball. Both Koufax and Don Drysdale joined the team just before the season opener following dual contract disputes. Drysdale had an off-year (for him) with a 13-16 record while Claude Osteen won 17 games and rookie sensation Don Sutton tallied 12...At the plate, the Dodgers finished in the middle of the pack with a .256 BA and 108 homers. The 1965 Rookie of the Year, Jim Lefebvre, whacked 24 home runs and drove in 74 to lead the offense. Lou Johnson followed with 17 jacks and 73 RBI...In the World Series, Baltimore Orioles pitching smothered the Dodger bats allowing only TWO runs, 17 hits, and one homer (by Lefebvre) in a four-game Series sweep. L. A. was shutout in three of those ballgames. Koufax allowed eight hits and four runs (1 earned) during a 6-0 Game 2 loss. He struck out two Orioles over six innings which turned out to be his last major league appearance. The Dodgers committed six errors in that same game. Drysdale suffered two losses in the Series. The Orioles scored 13 runs with 24 hits and four homers.
