The Reds welcomed three new members to the ballclub December 9, 1965 when they acquired pitchers Milt Pappas, Jack Baldschun, and outfielder Dick Simpson from Baltimore in exchange for slugger and future Hall of Famer, Frank Robinson. At the time of the trade, Robinson was 30-years-old, but Reds owner/GM Bill DeWitt felt Robby's best years had passed. Robinson took with him 324 homers; 1,009 RBI; a .303 batting average; and .943 OPS after his ten years wearing a Cincinnati uniform. (In 1966, he completed a Triple Crown wearing Orioles livery.) Between them, Pappas and Baldschun won 13 games and pitched 267 innings with a 4.55 ERA...Deron Johnson became the team leader with 24 home runs and 81 RBI, the latter a tie with Leo Cardenas. Cardenas hit 20 homers. Utilityman Art Shamsky clobbered 21 jacks in only 234 at bats. Pete Rose and Vada Pinson both popped 16 homers with 70 and 76 RBI, respectively. Rose, 25, finished ninth in the majors in batting average and second with 38 doubles. The Reds, as a team, hit .260 and 149 home runs...Twenty-seven-year-old fireballer Jim Maloney led the Reds mound platoon with 16 wins, 216 strikeouts, 10 complete games, and 5 shutouts. Both Sammy Ellis and Pappas won 12 contests. The pitching staff, with a 4.08 ERA (8th in the N. L.), struck out the second-most batters in the league (1,043)...Manager Don Heffner was fired during the All Star break with a 37-46 record, the team in eighth place, 15 games out of first. Third base coach Dave Bristol was named Heffner's replacement...DeWitt sold the franchise in December 1966... Tommy Helms, a natural shortstop, switched to third with "Chico" Cardenas entrenched at short. For his exemplary play, Helms was the recipient of the 1966 N. L. Rookie of the Year Award. He collected 154 base hits, nine home runs, and 49 RBI. He struck out only 31 times in 542 at bats.
