It was simply a coincidence, but the Cardinals completed two major developments for the franchise, May 8<sup>th</sup>: They obtained "The Baby Bull," Orlando Cepeda, in a swap with the Giants for pitcher Ray Sadecki, and played their last game in the former Sportsman's Park/Busch Stadium I. Busch Stadium II was christened on May 12<sup>th</sup> with a 4-3, 12 inning win over Atlanta and would be the team's home through 2005. St. Louis also hosted the All Star Game on July 12<sup>th</sup>...The Redbirds, who were in sixth place, 12 ½ games out of first with a 39-42 record at mid-season, never moved above fourth in the standings. They finished eighth in the N. L. with a .251 team BA and 108 home runs. The pitching staff forged the league's second-best ERA (3.11)...Twenty-eight-year-old Cepeda (a.k.a. Cha Cha) hit 17 homers and drove in 58 runs over 123 games played, good enough to top Mike Shannon's 16 jacks. Curt Flood was the RBI leader with 78 and awarded a Gold Glove. Tim McCarver's 13 triples were the most in the big leagues as well as Lou Brock's stolen base total. Brock also popped 15 homers, 12 triples, and 24 doubles...Ace Bob Gibson won 21 and lost 12 while leading the staff in strikeouts (225). Al Jackson, the former Met lefty, was next with 13 wins.
