A review of the Orioles 1966 season HAS to start with the acquisition of Frank Robinson from the Cincinnati Reds, December 9, 1965. Robby came to The Birds for three players: pitchers Milt Pappas and Jack Baldschun, and outfielder Dick Simpson. Robinson produced a season for the ages which included the rarely seen Triple Crown. One of the most feared hitters in the game, he led the A. L. with a .316 BA, a major league-leading 49 jacks, and a league-leading 122 RBI. He didn't stop there. Add to those lofty totals the best Slugging Percentage (.637), OPS (1.047), total bases (367), extra-base hits (85), and runs scored (122) in the big leagues. He finished tied with the Braves Felipe Alou in the last category. "Boog" Powell blasted 34 home runs and drove home 109. Brooks Robinson, "The Human Vacuum Cleaner", and Curt Blefary both hit 23 homers. Brooks knocked in 100 runs. The O's had the highest team batting average in the league at .258 along with the most runs scored (755), base hits (1,426), and doubles (243). Their 175 home runs placed them second...Twenty-year-old Jim Palmer led the pitching staff with 15 wins. Dave McNally posted 13 victories, Wally Bunker and Steve Barber both 10. The hurlers topped the majors with 51 saves; their ERA of 3.32 was fourth-best in the A. L...For the first time since 1944 when they were known as the St. Louis Browns, the Orioles vaulted to the World Series after winning the pennant by nine games over the Twins. Baltimore swept the Dodgers in the Fall Classic, 4-0, allowing Hollywood's favorites only TWO runs in the four games. The O's hit just .200 in the Series, but the Dodgers managed a miniscule 17 hits and a .142 batting average.
