From 1960-65 Cubs owner Phillip K. Wrigley devised and implemented a highly scorned strategy in the on-field management of the team by introducing a "College of Coaches." It involved a revolving corps of managers/coaches in an effort to get his non-competitive ballclub back in contention. It was an unmitigated failure. Wrigley abandoned his plan with the hiring of manager Leo "The Lip" Durocher--the philanderer and hot-head--to alleviate the sagging fortunes of his franchise. The Cubs were 3-12 after the season's first month and obviously going nowhere. They were shutout 17 times during the year; the longest losing streak was six games. They won 26 games in the first half, 33 the second...Ron Santo led the team with 30 homers and 94 RBI. "Sweet Swingin'" Billy Williams was right behind after clubbing 29 jacks and driving home 91. Chicago hit .254 and 140 home runs for the year...A valuable ingredient in the Cubs not-too-distant turn-around was obtained in a trade with the Phillies, April 21st: Ferguson Jenkins, 23, filled a role primarily as a reliever upon joining the ballclub in exchange for two washed-up pitchers. (Adolfo Phillips also came to the Cubs in the trade.) He won six games and whiffed 148 batters. Rookie Ken Holtzman, 20, produced the most wins (11) and strikeouts on the pitching staff (171). Cubs pitching was last in the N. L. with a 4.33 ERA and 809 runs allowed. Starter Dick Ellsworth lost 22 games and allowed 321 base hits, the most in the big leagues.
