Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Jays were refused the right to play ball at Rogers Centre as well as alternative PNC Park in Pittsburgh for "home" games. They finally found a place to nest for the 60-game schedule in the ballyard of their Triple A affiliate in Buffalo, the first time a recognized major league team played in that city since the Federal League's Buffalo Blues in 1915...The highly-heralded trio of Vladimir Guerrero, Jr., Cavan Biggio, and Bo Bichette--none older than twenty-five--combined for 22 of the Jays' 88 homers. The ball club's home run leader, Teoscar Hernandez, who won a regular role in leftfield, connected for sixteen. Randal Grichuk popped 12 jacks and led the team with 35 RBI. Hernandez accounted for 34 RBI; Guerrero, Jr. knocked in 33...Former Dodger Hyun Jin Ryu took over the Number One starters spot and led the Jays' staff with five wins and 72 strikeouts. He posted the eighth-best ERA in the big leagues...Toronto qualified for the playoffs and finished the regular campaign with a winning record for the first time since 2016. Their post-season quickly ended after falling to Tampa Bay, 2-0, in a best-of-three Wild Card series. The Jays were outscored, 11-3. Catcher Danny Jansen hit .400 and the ball club's only two home runs.
