The Padres mission had been set in 2020: NL West champs; reaching the NLDS; a plethora of young, highly-touted talent (at the plate and on the mound); possessing arguably the best player in the game (Fernando Tatis, Jr.); productive bats such as Eric Hosmer and Jake Cronenworth; the acquisition of All Star Adam Frazier--the ingredients for a run at the playoffs and World Series (by many pundits) in 2021. It didn't turn out that way. Sure, Joe Musgrove pitched the first no-hitter in Padres history in April while Tatis, Jr. raked for 42 homers and 97 RBI in a season plagued with injury. Manny Machado socked 28 HR and drove in 106. Musgrove went on to win 11 games and strikeout 203 batters. Mark Melancon led the majors in saves. As it turned out, the season fell off a cliff with a loss to Philadelphia, at home, August 22nd. At that point, San Diego was third and 12 1/2 games out. The Padres precipitous drop showed a 10-26 record from there to the end of the year. Meanwhile, the Giants and Dodgers both sprinted ahead to such large margins, the rest of the NL West only swallowed dust...The front office designated manager Jayce Tingler as the scapegoat. He was let go soon after the season.
