The strike-shortened 1981 season was one the Orioles would like to tuck away and forget about. They WERE a competitive ballclub all season long and one wonders how a full 162-game schedule would have worked out. The Birds spent a total of 28 calendar days in first of the AL East. Their biggest lead was three games on May 30<sup>th</sup>. They were never out of the top spot more than three-and-a-half games (April 29<sup>th</sup>) the entire campaign. Two second place finishes in both halves of the split-season (31-23 and 28-23, respectively) were good enough for a runner-up position overall with those records combined. Against division foes, they were 26-23: 7-6 versus the Yankees (1<sup>st</sup> half champs) and 2-4 versus Milwaukee (2<sup>nd</sup> half champions). A feather in their cap was an excellent 21-7 mark in one-run games (.750)... Dennis Martinez (14-5 W/L) tied four other major league hurlers for the most wins. Scott McGregor (13 wins) tied three others for sixth place. Martinez led the staff with nine complete games; McGregor with eight, topped the staff posting three shutouts... As one might expect in a shortened season, major league leaders in various categories would wind up bunched together. That was the case for Eddie Murray, whose 22 home runs tied five other sluggers for third place. The twenty-five-year-old first baseman, a second-time All Star, finished fourth in slugging percentage (.534); sixth in OPS (.895); and third in RBI (78). Ken Singleton and Doug DeCinces both clubbed 13 home runs while Rich Dauer ended the year among MLB leaders with 27 doubles...As a team, the Orioles hit .251 (10<sup>th</sup> in the A. L.); the pitching staff was seventh in ERA (3.70)...Jim Palmer, 35, was 7-8 for the year, including five complete games and 35 strikeouts.

On August 10<sup>th</sup>, a new chapter in the Orioles' rich history recorded the first appearance in a major league game by 20-year-old Cal Ripken, Jr. The International Leagues' (AAA) Rookie of the Year entered the game in the bottom of the 12<sup>th</sup> inning as a pinch-runner, a game the Birds won over Kansas City at Memorial Stadium, 3-2. He scored the winning run of the game from second base with none out following a single to right by John Lowenstein. Ripken finished 5 for 39 as a hitter in 23 games played. He fielded a position at shortstop in 12 games, third in six others, and committed three errors in 46 chances, but helped turn six double plays.
