By the end of April, the Red Sox had dropped into the American League's second division and would remain deeply cemented there for the remainder of the season. At the All Star break, they were in ninth place with a 31-51 record and 21 ½ games out of first. It was also their seventh straight losing campaign (of what would be eight) before the magic of 1967...The young ballplayers who would be the core of that '67 World Series ballclub were beginning to arrive at Fenway Park. Carl Yastrzemski, twenty-five-years-old and a starter since his rookie season of 1961, ended the year 10th in league MVP voting after a remarkable run in '65. He tied the Twins Zoilo Versalles (the MVP) for the major league lead in doubles (45) and led the A. L. with a slash of .395 (on-base percentage)/.536 (slugging percentage)/.932 (OPS). His batting average placed him seventh in the big leagues, a fraction of a point (.0002) behind Pete Rose who also hit .312. "Yaz" popped 20 home runs and knocked in 72 for the year. Tony Conigliaro, 20, topped the A. L. with 32 jacks and tied four others for sixth-most in the majors. Former Milwaukee Brave Felix Mantilla, who hit 18 homers, led the Bosox in RBI (92); "Tony C." was next with 82. Lee Thomas contributed 22 home runs as part of the Red Sox's league-high 165. They were second with a .251 team batting average...The pitching staff's 4.24 ERA was ninth out of ten teams. Earl Wilson posted the most wins (13) and strikeouts (164). He also slugged six homers. The four regular starters lost a total of 67 games. Six foot six Dick Radatz finished sixth in the majors with 22 saves. Bill Monbouquette yielded only 40 walks for a sparkling ratio of 1.574 per nine innings...The seeds had been planted for future success: Rico Petrocelli, 22, hit 13 home runs; rookie Jim Lonborg, 23, won nine ballgames; and Dave Morehead, 21, won ten times.
