The scintillating pennant race during the summer of '65 and into the last month of the season had SIX teams bunched together most of the year, each serious contenders for the N. L. flag. The Dodgers, Giants, Braves, and Reds, respectively, all had at least one day on top. Into September they skirmished with San Francisco taking a 4 ½ game lead in the aftermath of a 14-game winning streak with two weeks left to play. Those final days were all the Dodgers needed to go on a 13-game winning skein of their own. They won 15 of their last 16 ballgames to finish ahead of the Giants by two games. Los Angeles claimed first place for their own on September 28th with a 2-1 walk-off win over Cincinnati in twelve innings at Dodger Stadium. Lou Johnson, who had joined the ballclub early in the year after Tommy Davis suffered a broken ankle sliding into a base, won that game with a home run...Along with the rip-roaring pennant race, the Dodgers and Giants kept up their penchant for war on the diamond. On April 29th, the Dodgers' Don Drysdale had decked Willie Mays with a fastball under Mays's chin. Baseball players have LONG memories. On August 22nd in San Francisco, Juan Marichal, already fed up with violent turmoil in his homeland, Cuba, and not knowing anything about the fate of his family there, wasn't feeling well physically from the stress. In the first inning, Marichal threw a "purpose pitch" close to Maury Wills. Dodgers' starter Sandy Koufax retaliated by throwing a ball over Mays's head. In the third, Marichal returned the favor by brushing back the Dodgers' Ron Fairly. Following warnings to each dugout, Koufax knew he could no longer hit or come close to hitting any Giant batter; so, catcher John Roseboro threw a ball back to Koufax close to Marichal's ear with the Giants' hurler at the plate. Marichal took exception, touching off a brou-ha-ha which saw him strike Roseboro over the noggin' with his bat, opening a large gash on top of Roseboro's head. The Giants won the game, 4-3...The World Series was a dandy as well but not as a battle of the benches. The Minnesota Twins won the first two games in Minneapolis; the Dodgers took the next three in L. A. Two were shutouts. Back in Twins country for Game 6, Minnesota tied the series, 3-3, taking a five-run lead to the seventh. The final score was 5-1. Sandy Koufax, the series MVP, tossed a three-hit, 10 strikeout gem in Game 7 (2-0) for the Dodgers fourth World Series title. Koufax, the N. L. Cy Young winner--and second in MVP voting behind Mays--posted a 0.38 ERA in the Series with 29 K's in 24 innings pitched...The Dodgers' great lefthander had a dream regular season as well. He led the majors with 26 wins, a .765 winning percentage, 2.04 ERA, 0.855 WHIP, 382 strikeouts, 27 complete games, and a 5.38 ratio of strikeouts/walks. All this with an inflamed arthritic left elbow causing incessant pain...The Dodgers were not "Giant Killers" at the plate: They were last in the league in homers (78) and seventh in batting average (.245). They led the majors in stolen bases (172), Maury Wills out-stealing the Cardinals' Lou Brock by 31 bags. N. L. Rookie of the Year Jim Lefebvre and the aforementioned Johnson topped the team with 12 homers each. Fairly had the most RBI (70); Lefebvre knocked in 69. Drysdale won 23 games, whiffed 210 foes and swatted 7 home runs with his bat. Claude Osteen quietly tallied a welcome 15 wins.
