The Giants got off to a slow start but rallied to get back into serious contention by the end of May, a month they won 19 of 30 games. July and August were months they flipped-flopped between second and third place, but when September rolled around, a consecutive 14-game winning streak thrust them into first place and a 4 ½ game lead, September 16th. From the 17th to the season's final day, the ballclub went 8-8 (eventually relinquishing first place on the 28th) while the Dodgers rocketed to the NL pennant by winning 14 of their last 15 games. The season series between the two old rivals had already been completed--the Giants won 8 of the 18 regular season meetings. Willie Mays was awarded the league's MVP trophy after a season where he led The Big Show with 52 homers, a .398 OBP, .645 slugging percentage, and 1.043 OPS. He topped the Giants with 112 RBI. Willie McCovey (10th in MVP voting) was right behind with 39 jacks and 92 RBI. “Big Mac’s” slash ended at .381/.539/.920...The infamous bat assault incident on the field between L.A.’s John Roseboro and Juan Marichal, August 22nd at Candlestick Park (Marichal felt Roseboro was deliberately coming too close to his head on return tosses to Sandy Koufax while at bat that day) didn’t stop the Giants’ ace from winning 22 ballgames, leading the majors with 10 shutouts, and finishing second to Koufax in ERA, WHIP (.914) and complete games (24). He was stingy with only 1.4 batters walked per nine innings pitched, the best mark in the NL. The “Baby Bull,” Orlando Cepeda, was limited to 33 games while trying to play through a knee injury he had sustained during winter ball in late 1962. He played the entire ‘63 and ‘64 seasons with the injury before finally disclosing the problem to management and returning home to Puerto Rico during the ‘65 season to receive therapy.
