The month of June was a good one for the Tribe. After playing .500 baseball the first two months of the season, they went on the warpath with a consecutive 10-game winning streak, June 13<sup>th</sup> through the 22<sup>nd</sup>, catapulting them from sixth place May 29<sup>th</sup> to second June 22<sup>nd</sup>. The end of the streak came with a loss to the first place Twins during a weekend series in Cleveland. The Indians WON their regular season meetings with Minnesota, 11-7. The All Star break showed the ballclub in second five games out of first, 48-34. They fell from the runner-up spot the remainder of the year when the Kansas City A's took two games of a three game set at Cleveland Stadium August 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup>. The Indians reached third place as late as September 2<sup>nd</sup> but were 9 ½ games out by that time. They recorded a 13-16 record from there to the season's conclusion... The beloved and sorely missed "Rocky" Colavito returned to the Tribe as part of a three-team trade in January. He socked 26 home runs and led the American League with 108 RBI and 93 walks. Leon Wagner clubbed the most homers (28) while Fred Whitfield and Max Alvis added 26 and 21 home runs, respectively. Whitfield accounted for 90 RBI; super-utility man Chuck Hinton tacked on 18 jacks as part of the Tribe's 156 dingers for the year... Twenty-two-year-old Sam McDowell was second in the majors with 325 strikeouts, but he also led all hurlers with 132 walks. He posted the best ERA in the A. L. "Sudden Sam" also finished second to Sandy Koufax after allowing only 5.868 hits per nine innings to Koufax's 5.792. McDowell was a winner of 17 ballgames. Fellow rotation stalwart "Sonny" Siebert won 16 games, struck out 191, and was fourth to Koufax with 4.152 K's per walk allowed. Koufax came in at 5.380.
