The defending World Champions started the season well under expectations. With the return of Ronald Acuna, Jr. (15 HRs, 50 RBI), still hampered slightly with a cranky right knee following surgery in 2021, combined with a top-shelf line-up of Ozzie Albies, Austin Riley, Dansby Swanson, Max Fried, *et al*, most believed the NL East belonged to the Braves despite the huge cash outlay by the Mets to strengthen their roster. Atlanta was 10-12, in fourth place, at the end of April, then began to pick-up the pace. By May's conclusion, they had climbed to second place, four games below .500, but 10 ½ games in back of New York. The Braves became serious contenders starting June 1st, reeling off 14 straight wins and chopping the Mets lead to four games. Throughout the summer, the Mets advantage slowly began to dwindle. The Braves played .653 baseball (64-34) from mid-June to the end of the year while the Metropolitans stumbled drastically. As the Braves seemed to win everyday, the opposite was happening with New York. From June 15th to the end of the season, the Mets, playing 94 games, won 60, but a Braves sweep of a three-game series in Atlanta September 30th through October 2nd was enough to take the Division crown and eliminate a possible tie-breaking game for first...Atlanta received a first-round (Wild Card) bye to start the expanded playoffs; however, NL East foe Philadelphia won a Division series over the Braves, 3-1, a best-of-five. The only win by the favored Braves was a 3-0 shutout at home by Kyle Wright (2 hits allowed, 6 K's) and three relievers who gave up only one other safety...The Atlanta offense was full of TNT all year long. They topped the N. L. with 243 homeruns and .443 slugging percentage. Nine Braves blasted double-digit home run totals. Riley's 38 led the way, newcomer Matt Olson from Oakland (with big, big shoes to fill as departed free-agent Freddie Freeman signed on with the Dodgers) fit right in with his 34 jacks and team high 103 RBI. Swanson contributed 25 homers and 96 RBI. Olson totaled 93 runs batted in. Albies popped eight home runs prior to missing most of the year because of two separate injuries... The pitching staff was among baseball's best. Wright had the most wins in the big leagues (21). He struck out 174. Ace Max Fried won 14 ballgames while nine-game winner Charlie Morton's 205 K's were ninth most in the majors. Twenty-three-year old phenom Spencer Strider, who began the year working as a reliever, won eleven times and amazed everyone with 202 strikeouts. Closer Kenley Jansen was second in the majors with 41 saves. Morton struck out more than ten batters per nine innings pitched. Strider punched out 13.8 batters per nine innings, but didn't have enough frames to qualify for the top spot. The Braves staff ERA (3.46) was second in the N. L. along with their 1,554 strikeouts. The relief corps totaled the big leagues' most saves (55)...Rookie of the Year Michael Harris, 21, impressive from the start, joined the ball club mid-season, contributing 19 homers, 64 RBI, and appeared destined to become the long-term starter in centerfield after showcasing his excellent over-all abilities.
