Dodger Dominance: June 23rd was the day the Dodgers stepped into first place of the NL West alone and for good and fired up all cylinders on offense while the pitching staff suffocated the rest of the league from scoring runs. A 2 ½ game lead on June 30th quickly expanded to a 12-game margin one month later as the ballclub won 21 of 26 games which included a consecutive 12-game winning streak. August ended with them winning 22 of 28 games. Responsible for all this firepower and off-the-charts pitching--2.80 ERA, the best in baseball--was an army of the game's elite. Free agent Freddie Freeman decided to try on Dodger Blue, proceeding to lead the big leagues with 47 doubles and 199 base hits and the N. L. with a .407 OBP while tying teammate "Mookie" Betts for the league's most runs (117). He wound up finishing .001 of a point behind the Mets Jeff McNeil for the major league batting crown. Freeman and Trea Turner both drove home 100 runs. Betts hit 35 of the Dodgers 212 homers for the year. He added 82 RBI and won his sixth career Gold Glove. Catcher Will Smith (87 RBI) blasted 24 jacks; Freeman, Turner, and Max Muncy all bashed 21...The pitching corps mowed 'em down with 1,465 strikeouts over 1,451.1 innings pitched. Julio Urias and Tony Gonsolin paced the staff posting 17 and 16 wins, respectively. Urias' 166 K's topped the hurlers. His ERA was second to the Astros Justin Verlander in the majors. Gonsolin did not qualify with enough innings to be on the list; however, his .941 winning percentage out-classed Verlander's .818. Tyler Anderson racked-up 15 W's, Clayton Kershaw 12...Drawing a Wild Card Round bye, the Dodgers engaged the Padres, against whom L. A. won 14 of 19 meetings during the regular season, in a league division series. Their four-game battle saw no games end with a difference of more than two runs, but it was the Padres who moved on to the NLCS, winning three contests to knock out Los Angeles.
