Bronx Barrage: The Yanks led all of baseball with 254 homers while finishing second to the Dodgers with 807 runs scored. That's nearly five runs per game. (The Dodgers tallied 847.) Aaron Judge accounted for a new American League record with 62 home runs to surpass Roger Maris's 61 in 1961. Judge hit #61 September 28th at Rogers Centre in Toronto, then broke the record in the second game of a doubleheader in Texas, a solo home run in the first inning, October 4th. His American League MVP season was capped with major league bests in on-base percentage, slugging percentage, and OPS: .425/.686/1.111, respectively; runs scored (133); and extra-base hits (90). He tied the Mets Pete Alonso for the most RBI (131). Free agent-to-be Anthony Rizzo re-upped in New York and banged out 32 jacks, Giancarlo Stanton added 31, and Gleyber Torres contributed 24. Thirty-six-year old former Cardinal Matt Carpenter, plucked out of the minor leagues mid-season, was a revelation with 15 homers and 37 RBI in 47 games...The second best ERA in the A. L. (3.30) belonged to the Yankee pitching staff led by Jameson Taillon's 14 wins. He was accompanied by Gerrit Cole's 13 and Nestor Cortes' 12. Cole punched out 257 opponents; Cortes whiffed 163...The Yankees were dominating the AL East right up to the All Star break with a 64-28 record and 13-game lead. A July swoon after the break which stretched into early September--19 wins in 47 games--reduced their lead to 3 1/2 games on September 9th. As the disgruntled fans, once again, called for the ouster of skipper Aaron Boone, the Bombers held on to end the regular season seven games up on the Blue Jays...The post-season started for New York with a division series against the AL Central top dog Cleveland Guardians in a best-of-five. The Yanks moved on to face the rocketing Houston Astros in the ALCS after knocking out Cleveland, three games to two. The Space City group won four straight in a best-of-seven match-up to wind-up New York's campaign. In the ALCS, the Yankees hit a paltry .162 and three home runs. Houston batted .238, outscoring the Yanks 18-9...Another former Cardinal, Harrison Bader, hit .400 to go with two homers...The Yankees clinched their 30th consecutive season with a winning record, September 7th.
