How good are the Dodgers? These numbers tell part of the story: eleven straight playoff appearances and TEN NL West division championships--now the longest active post-season stretch in baseball history. There's more: four consecutive seasons they have won 100-plus games (not counting the "Covid" season of 2020), a first for any major league team. And this ballclub scored 900 or more runs (906 in 2023) for the sixth time in franchise history...Dodger hitters bashed 249 home runs for the year, including 33 or more from three sluggers: "Mookie" Betts (39), Max Muncy (36), and J. D. Martinez (33). Betts had the most RBI (107) while Muncy finished with 105. Freddie Freeman (29 HRs, 102 RBI) had a splendid season, finishing third in the majors in batting average, second in base hits (211), and seventh in OPS (.976). Betts' OPS, .987, was fifth highest in the big leagues. Freeman led the majors in doubles (59) and extra-base hits (90)...Thirty-five-year old Clayton Kershaw won 13 games to top the Dodger staff. Bobby Miller, 24, and Julio Urias, 26, both won 11 times...From July 14th to the end of the season, the Dodgers held first place while impressively distancing themselves from the pack. They really turned on the throttle in August, going 24-5, ending the month leading the division by 13 ½ games. In August and September combined, L. A. played .707 baseball (41-17) as second place Arizona ran out of gas winning only 27 of 55 games. The Dodgers won the division by sixteen...It's very true when it comes to the post-season: throw out the records and start 0-0--it's a completely different time of year. The Dodgers and Arizona squared off in a NL Division series during which the upstart Diamondbacks laid waste to L. A. starting pitching, sweeping the series three games to none, as Arizona out-hit the Dodgers .284 to .177, out-scored them 19-6, and out-homered them, 9-1.
