The young birds the Blue Jays organization had added to their flock in recent years have fully blossomed and now ready to create havoc in the AL East. The addition of free agents Chris Bassitt and Kevin Kiermaier fit in nicely with a team already revved up with young stars. Daulton Varsho, 26, was acquired via a trade in the off-season to further deepen this squadron of Jays. No one was a disappointment. Vlad Guerrero Jr.'s 26 homers and 94 RBI topped the list of everyday players. Veteran George Springer followed with 21 jacks. Bo Bichette, 24, was among the big leagues batting average leaders all season long. He hit 20 home runs and drove home 73. Varsho added 20 homers and 61 RBI as well as great defense and versatility. Both Varsho and Kiermaier won Gold Gloves. Kiermaier contributed eight home runs. Brandon Belt, 35, served primarily as the designated hitter and popped 19 homers...Bassitt ate up bushels full of innings winning 16 ballgames, tying the Rays Zach Eflin for the most in the American League. Kevin Gausman won 12 games and finished second in the majors with 237 strikeouts (11.53 per nine innings). Closer Jordan Romano locked down enough saves to end the year second in the league. As a staff, Toronto pitchers posted the most saves in the A. L. (51) and second best ERA (3.78)...The Jays exciting ballclub rocked the Rogers Centre, drawing over 3 million fans for the year (the first time since 2017) and qualifying for the playoffs for the third time in four years. The Blue Jays had their wings clipped in a best-of-three Wild Card series with Minnesota, the Twins sweeping the first two games at Target Field to wrap up the Jays season.
