Since winning a World Championship in 2019, the Nats have experienced seasons of plain mediocrity. A record of 217-329 (.397) is a testament to that. The 2023 version demonstrated that better days may not be far away. The Nats got off to a choppy start, winning 25 of their first 57 games, but nine wins in June was no where near enough to change their status in the NL East. Right after the All Star break, the ballclub showed some spark, winning 25 of 40 games, including a later stretch of 11 wins in 15 contests. Sixty-two wins and 73 loses on the board at the end of August provided some hope for the future...August 9<sup>th</sup>, the Nats were no-hit victims of the Reds Michael Lorenzen...A talented squad of youngsters were a big part of the offense and .254 team batting average, fifth-best in the league. Lane Thomas, 27, had a break-out season: 28 homers, 86 RBI, and recognition for his excellent defense. Keibert Ruiz, 24, added 18 home runs with 67 RBI; shortstop CJ Abrams, 22, also rang up 18 jacks and 64 RBI. He also posted the third-most stolen bases in the N. L. Sorely missed was centerfielder Jose Robles' glove, bat, and speed. Robles, 26, was able to play in just 36 games. All Star pitcher Josiah Gray, 25, took a leap upward in his career, winning eight and striking out 143. Starter MacKenzie Gore, highly regarded and only 24 years of age, won seven but topped the staff with 151 strikeouts. Still a puzzle after winning 14 games in 2019, Patrick Corbin threw the most innings and finished with 10 wins and 15 losses. He's won only 27 games in 105 starts since 2019 to a 5.62 ERA while allowing 107 home runs.
