The defending National League champions certainly looked like the team to challenge the Braves for the division title after adding free agent closer Craig Kimbrel, starter Taijuan Walker, and the highly coveted and talented Trea Turner, the latter receiving an 11-year, \$300 million contract. However, the Phils ended April 15-14 and were no better in May. The ballclub just didn't hit and the pitching was just OK. Turner's strong hitting at the top of the line-up was most noticeably absent. Bryce Harper was sidelined until May 2nd after recovering from Tommy John surgery. The Phillies lost a season-high six straight games in May, won five straight, then lost five more consecutively to wrap up the month with a 10-16 record, 25-30 overall, placing them fourth, 7 ½ games behind the rampaging Braves. Starting June 1<sup>st</sup>, the Phightins' ran the course of the year with a 64-42 record (.604) as the bats (namely Turner) came alive and Harper returned to the line-up earlier than expected. Despite their winning ways in the second half of the year, they had fallen too far behind Atlanta to really challenge for the lead and settled for a Wild Card spot in the post-season. They won five of their first six: a two games to none sweep of Miami and stunning those same Braves, 3-1, in their NLDS showdown. Philadelphia pounded Braves pitching for a .275 batting average and eleven home runs, four coming from Nick Castellanos and three from Harper. Turner hit .471 with two jacks. The Phils outscored Atlanta 20-8, holding them to a .186 BA. In the NLCS against Arizona, the Phillies won the first two of the best-of-seven, including a 10-0 pasting in Game Two. Philadelphia went up in the series, 3-2, before the Diamondbacks won the final two games at Citizens Bank Park and the series to become N. L. champions...Lead-off man Kyle Schwarber hit a paltry .197, but his 47 homers led the team. His 104 RBI were second to Castellanos' 106, the latter bashing 29 home runs. Harper's bat was potent as well: 21 homers, 72 RBI. Turner added 26 HRs and 76 RBI. A great surprise was Walker's 15 wins. Zack Wheeler claimed 13 W's and Aaron Nola 12. Wheeler punched out 212 batters.
