Good Guys Wear a Ten Gallon Hat: From the beginning of the season through August 26th, the ballclub was in first place (or tied) in the A. L. West with the pesky Astros on their heels and Mariners not far behind. For the remainder of the season, the Rangers were 17-16 while the Astros, who were 18-14, eventually tied the Rangers for the top spot. Texas had to surrender the division crown to Houston because the Astros won the season series, 9-4. The Rangers largest lead had been 6 ½ games, June 23rd. All this after the Rangers had lost 102 games in 2021 and 94 in 2022. Bruce Bochy found a way to turn that around in a hurry...**Team Leaders:** Texas led the league with a slash of .263 (BA), .337 (OBP), .452 (SLG%), and .790 (OPS). The Rangers had 102 batters hit at least 10 home runs of their league-high 233. The cannonade started with Adolis Garcia's 39 jacks and 107 RBI. Corey Seager's 33 homers were next (he drove in 96), and Marcus Semien was good for 29 home runs and 100 RBI. Youngster Josh Jung hit 25 balls over the fence. The slugging rookie added 70 RBI. Semien's 122 runs were second in the majors while Seager finished second in SLG% (.623) and OPS (1.013)...Nathan Eovaldi led the pitching staff with 12 wins. The trio of Dane Dunning, Andrew Healey and Martin Perez all won 10 games. Jordan Montgomery, picked up at the trading deadline, was a big boost to the staff. He contributed four wins with a 1.094 WHIP...The Rangers came out with guns blazing in the post-season, winning their first five games. In the ALCS, Texas won the last two games to eliminate Houston in seven games. The World Series was dominated by the Rangers even though the N. L. Champion Arizona Diamondbacks out hit them .270 to .218. The difference was the pitching. The Rangers raked Arizona relievers for 27 hits in 26.2 innings and a 5.06 ERA, including 20 of the Rangers 26 runs. Corey Seager had another monster post-season, taking home the World Series MVP trophy (3 HRs, 6 RBI). In four post-season series he hit .318 with six doubles, six homers, 10 RBI and 1.133 OPS. Bochy came out of retirement to win his fourth World Series ring, the franchise's first since being born as the expansion Washington Senators in 1961. Texas won all 11 playoff road games, a MLB record.
