The 1964 pennant race in the National League turned out to be another exciting one in the early-mid 60s. The Giants, Cardinals, Phillies, Reds, and Braves wrestled for the lead for most of the year. A ballclub which held or was tied for first for 57 calendar days, never led the league by more than two games or trailed by more than 8 %. Second as late as September 12<sup>th</sup>, the Giants were 10-8 in their final string of games as the Cardinals surged past the aforementioned teams to win the pennant. Perhaps the tell-tale sign as testimony for their fourth place finish was a 28-26 record against the teams finishing above them. They impressively subdued the arch-rival Dodgers, winning 12 of 18 games..Willie Mays was "All World": He led the majors in slugging percentage (.607), wound up third with a .990 OPS, second in homers (47), second in runs scored (121), and tied for fifth in RBI (111). Orlando Cepeda, aka "Cha Cha" or "The Baby Bull," along with Jim Ray Hart, hit 31 homers. The Giants led the league with 165...High-kicking Juan Marichal finished among major league leaders in wins (21, 2<sup>nd</sup>), ERA (7<sup>th</sup>), strikeouts (206, 10<sup>th</sup>), while completing the most games (22)...Twenty-year-old rookie Masanori Murakami, a contemporary of the great home run hitter Sadaharu Oh in the Japanese Nippon Professional Baseball League, became the first Japanese-born player to play in the big leagues when he debuted September 1<sup>st</sup>. He came on in relief against the Mets in the ninth inning, striking out two of four batters he faced. September 29<sup>th</sup>, he won his first game in the majors, beating the Houston Colt .45s in an 11-inning, 5-4 victory...It was ironic the Dodgers fabled "Silver Fox," Duke Snider, would play his last games wearing a Giants uniform. Primarily a pinch-hitter and substitute outfielder in 91 games and 167 at bats, the forever beloved one-time Flatbush great hit the last four of his career 407 home runs, ending an 18-year career.
