The only reason the Senators didn't finish last was because Charlie Finley's Kansas City A's were five games worse. The Nats even took the season series (their only one), ten games to eight. In 1963, the Senators original owner, retired USAF Lieutenant General and FAA Commissioner, Elwood "Pete" Quesada, had sold the franchise to a duo of James M. Johnston and James H. Lemon. The former, an investment banker, was a huge legacy contributor to his alma mater, UNC-Chapel Hill, while the latter, a Princeton graduate, called his occupation investment banker as well. Their manager, former Dodger great Gil Hodges, had just turned in his player's uniform the year before for a seat in the dugout and an opportunity to ply his trade. Gil started the Senators on a positive rise before he was coaxed away by the Mets in 1968...One could call the Senators an old team littered with players well past their prime. Bill Skowron, 33, started the year at first base and hit 13 homers before being traded to the White Sox. Another former Dodger, Don Zimmer, a super-utility man, played some good baseball and knocked out 12 home runs. Virtually unknown 27-year-old centerfielder Don Lock, who struck out at a high ratio, led the team with 27 jacks and 80 RBI. Army veteran Chuck Hinton, 30, had the highest batting average among the regulars and added 11 homers...Claude Osteen, 24, a lefthander coming into his own and who would be sporting a Dodger uniform in 1965, won a remarkable team high fifteen. He completed 13 ballgames...The Nats scored 578 runs but allowed 733...The Senators had drafted a first-year budding outfielder named Lou Piniella from Cleveland in late '62, but traded him August 4th as the player-to-be-named-later to the Orioles to complete a pre-season deal for would be 15-game loser "Buster" Narum...At least they had Gil...
