For fans of the White Sox, Yankees, and Orioles, the 1964 American League season featured one of the most exciting, day-to-day pennant races between these three ballclubs. Studying the numbers, the Sox and Yanks each spent a bit over 30 calendar days alone or tied for first place. The Orioles, meanwhile, owned or were tied for first 111 calendar days. At the All Star break, the standings showed the White Sox and New York tied for second, three games out. September 1st closed with Baltimore leading the Pale Hose by one-half game and the Yankees by two games. The September stretch run made the difference to determine the champion and trip to the World Series. New York charged through the month 22-6, Chicago was 14-10, while Baltimore fell off to 15-13, a season the O's did not have a losing record any month. Interestingly, there were zero head-to-head meetings between any of these teams that last full month...White Sox bats produced a .247 batting average (sixth in the league), but the pitching was splendid, keeping the Sox in the race all season long. The White Sox presented a staff with the major league's best ERA (2.72)! Gary Peters tied the Angels Dean Chance with 20 wins to lead the A. L. Lefty Juan Pizarro won 19 ballgames, Joe Horlen 13, and closer Hoyt Wilhelm, 41, won 12. His save total was second in the majors...Third baseman Pete Ward was the offensive leader (23 jacks, 94 RBI). Shortstop Ron Hansen went yard 20 times and drove in 68 runs. A good hitting pitcher, Peters added 4 homers, 19 RBI, and 7 doubles. Long-time Sox hero Minnie Minoso, 40, played his last full season until cameo appearances in 1976 and 1977, producing one home run in 31 at bats...A tad over 1.25 million exuberant fans clicked the turnstiles at Charlie Comiskey's old White Sox Park.
