The Braves and the Cardinals shared the best batting average in the major leagues (.272). The franchise's second-to-last season in Milwaukee finished with the ballclub leading the majors in team OPS (.751) and the most runs scored (803). Their 159 home runs were second among N. L. "nines." This team sat on the periphery of the league leaders most of the season. By the All Star break they were two games under .500 and in seventh place. For the remainder of the year, they stayed close, going 50-34 (.595) and concluded the campaign winning ten of their last eleven games. Against the four teams above them in the final standings: the Cardinals, Phillies, Reds, and Giants, first to fourth in order, the Braves were an even 36-36...Three members of the team ended the year among the top five in batting average in the big leagues: Rico Carty, Hank Aaron, and Joe Torre. Torre topped the ballclub with 193 base hits and 109 RBI. Aaron wound up among the top ten in the majors in hits (187), runs scored (103), and stolen bases. Lee Maye led all major leaguers with a huge haul of 44 doubles. Five Braves sluggers sent as least 20 homers out of a ballpark. Aaron had the most (24) followed by Eddie Mathews' 23...Twenty-three-year old Tony Cloninger was among the top six of MLB with 19 wins and 15 complete games. Phil Niekro, 25, appeared on a big league mound for the first time against the Giants, April 15th, pitching a third-of-an-inning in relief. A future solid reliever for the Braves and later the Reds, Clay Carroll, 23, debuted in September allowing a hit and picking up a strikeout in two innings facing the Cardinals. Denny Lemaster was a 17-game winner and led the staff with 185 strikeouts. Warren Spahn, in his last go-round with the Braves, won six ballgames, his final one #356 of his career total 363...The Braves had planned and were ready to move to Atlanta after the season, however, the courts intervened, keeping them in Milwaukee one more year.
