The Cardinals effectively popped the bubble of the Yankee dynasty, which had originated in the 1920s, with a World Series upset of the Bombers, four games to three. It came about in part after one of the most lop-sided trades in baseball history. On June 15th, St. Louis acquired Lou Brock from the Cubs in exchange for pitchers Ernie Broglio and Bobby Shantz as well as utility outfielder Doug Clemens. Cardinals GM Bing Devine felt the ballclub needed more speed and a legitimate lead-off hitter. He plugged Brock into leftfield in place of Clemens and light-hitting Charlie James. Brock fit in nicely with a plus .300 BA, 12 home runs, 44 RBI, 21 doubles, 9 triples, and a .915 OPS in 103 games. The ballclub also promoted Mike Shannon, 24, to become the regular rightfielder. When Brock joined the Cards, the team was in eighth place with a 28-31 record but only seven games out of first. Owner Gussie Busch fired Devine on August 16th with the ballclub in fifth and nine games out. Manager Johnny Keane rallied the troops into a dogfight with the Phillies and Reds which ended on the regular season's final day. After September 23rd, the Redbirds went 11-2, the Phillies were 2-7, and the Redlegs 6-4, enough for the Cardinals to win the N. L. pennant by one game over the two challengers. In the Fall Classic, the Yankees and Cardinals split the first six games before St. Louis won the finale at Busch Stadium, 7-5. Bob Gibson won two contests and struck out 31 batters in 27 innings pitched. Battery mate Tim McCarver, 22, led the team with a .478 BA and 11 hits, three for extra bases...N. L. MVP Ken Boyer ended the year with the most home runs (24) and RBI (119). Curt Flood produced 211 base hits. Bill White added 21 jacks and 102 RBI. The Cards hit an N. L.-best .272 and 109 homers...Gibson, Curt Simmons, and Ray Sadecki accounted for 61 percent of the Cardinals victories. Sadecki won 20 ballgames, Gibson 19, and Simmons 18. Gibby's 245 K's were the second-most in the big leagues. The pitching staff was sixth with a 3.43 ERA.
