From 1946 (a World Series loss to the Cardinals) until 1967 (a World Series loss again to St. Louis), the Red Sox were perennially second division ball clubs in the eight or ten-team American League. They did finish as high as second in 1948—one game behind Cleveland who won a one-game playoff to determine the A. L. champion—and 1949 after winding up the year a game behind the Yankees. The Bosox also finished third five times during that 19-year stretch. The '64 season was no different. The high-water mark was June 13<sup>th</sup> with the Red Sox in fifth place 5 ½ games out and two games over .500. Former Red Sox star, the beloved Johnny Pesky, lost his managers job with two games remaining in the season. One of the best hitters in baseball history and future Hall of Famer Billy Herman (Cubs and Dodgers), a coach for Pesky, rounded-out the year and managed the team all of 1965 and part of 1966—both losing campaigns...This edition of the Bosox could really hit (.258, 1<sup>st</sup> in the league) and ended the year second in homers (186) as well as first in doubles (253). The loudest bat was wielded by "Dr. Strangeglove," Dick Stuart, who led the team with 33 homers and 114 RBI. Super-utility man Felix Mantilla knocked 30 baseballs out of the park, six others popped at least 13 jacks. Nineteen-year old rookie Tony Conigliaro swatted 24 HRs. Carl Yastrzemski, 24, hit 15 homers and drove home 67...The pitching was not a strong point. The staff ERA (4.50) placed them second-to-last in the league; however, they were third in strikeouts (1,094). Bill Monbouquette, who had pitched a no-hitter in 1962, led the starters with 13 wins. Earl Wilson won 11 games and showed his prowess with the bat, hitting five homers and knocking in 13 runs during the season. Imposing six-foot-six reliever Dick Radatz, nicknamed "The Monster," topped the pitching corps with 16 wins and the major leagues in saves. He whiffed 181 batters, 10.4 per nine innings pitched.
