A talented bunch of twenty-somethings dotted the roster, a core group which would lead the Tigers to be perennial contenders for the pennant right into the early Seventies. The names are familiar to baseball fans: Bill Freehan, Dick McAuliffe, Willie Horton, pinch-hitter extraordinaire Gates Brown, the ballclub's established star Al Kaline, Mickey Lolich, 20-year-old Denny McLain, and two ballplayers who first appeared in September, Mickey Stanley and Jim Northrup. Shortstop McAuliffe, who would later move to second base where he is best known, led the Tigers in homers with 24. Norm Cash's 83 RBI were the most on the team; he contributed 23 jacks. Freehan popped 18 home runs, drove home 80 and became the darling of the mound staff. Utilityman Don Demeter added 22 homers and totaled 80 RBI. Kaline, 29, in his eleventh full season in a Tiger uniform, won his seventh Gold Glove while hitting 17 home runs and driving home 68. Brown played the majority of games in leftfield. His stats on offense were 15 homers and 54 RBI. Detroit finished second in the American League with a .253 batting average...Youngsters such as Lolich, 23, and McLain, established themselves as regulars in the starting rotation. The former won 18 ballgames and led the staff with 192 strikeouts. McLain, promoted from the minors mid-season, won four times. The team's biggest winner was Dave Wickersham who won 19 games. Those were the most wins in his career and about 28 percent of all his career victories, combined, over ten years...The Tigers were caged around .500 most of the season, but after the All Star break they won 47 of 85 games to finish fourth. Versus the teams which finished ahead of them (Yankees, White Sox, and Orioles), they were 22-32.
