Solid contenders for the American League pennant in both 1962 and 1963, the Twins were an also-ran in 1964. At the All Star break they were fourth and seven games out of first. July was not a good month for the ballclub--11-18 overall, 7-16 from the 9th until the end of the month. This slotted the Twins in sixth, 13 games behind and out of contention...Cuban immigrant Tony Oliva highlighted the season by winning the league's Rookie of the Year. The 25-year-old led the league in batting average, runs scored (109), and doubles (43). Oliva collected the most base hits in the majors (217) and also finished fourth in MVP voting. He led a quartet which hit four straight home runs back-to-back in Kansas City, May 2nd. Joining Oliva were Bob Allison, Jimmie Hall, and Harmon Killebrew, the onslaught coming in the 11th inning of a 7-3 win. The barrage tied the '61 Braves and '63 Indians for the big league record at the time. Not surprisingly, the Twins totaled 221 homers, the most in MLB. Six ballplayers hit 20 or more homers, including Killebrew's major league high 49. His 111 RBI led the team followed by Oliva's 94...Jim "Mudcat" Grant allowed 13 singles and a walk to the Senators, July 15th. NONE of the Nats scored in the 6-0 whitewashing...The pitching staff got 17 wins from Jim Kaat and 15 from Camilo Pascual. The latter tallied the most strikeouts (213). Grant won 11 ballgames after coming to the Twins in a trade with Cleveland at the trading deadline...A youngster named Rod Carew was signed as an amateur free agent, June 24th.
