The 1964 season marked a watershed of transition for the Yankee franchise from top to bottom...Old stalwart Yogi Berra was handed the keys to the manager's office as Ralph Houk, after three years as skipper, was promoted upstairs to the General Manager's post. The Yanks got off to a rocky start having to deal with assorted injuries to their prime players on the field. The season came to a head in late August with what is known as "The Harmonica Incident." On a team bus, Phil Linz was screeching out Mary Had A Little Lamb on his harmonica in hopes of becoming more proficient. For the most part, the season was not going as well as the Yankee brass had feared; they weren't sure if Berra would succeed as now being the boss of his former teammates, many for years. Berra, in a fit of pique, yelled from the front of the bus for Linz to stop playing his harmonica. Linz wasn't able to clearly hear what the manager said so he asked Mickey Mantle what Berra had shouted. Mickey told Linz Berra wanted him to play the harmonica LOUDER which resulted in Berra rushing to the back of the bus in a rage and snatching Linz's harmonica. Reportedly, the confrontation sparked the Yankees to the pennant after being swept by Chicago prior to the fateful bus ride. New York won the American League flag by just ONE game over the said White Sox. The sun for the franchise was beginning to rapidly descend after the '64 World Series loss to St. Louis in seven games. The Yankees would not reach the post-season again until 1976. Ironically, the champion Cardinals manager, Johnny Keane, replaced Berra who was fired after one season in the manager's seat...*Team leaders: Mantle (35 homers, 111 RBI, 92 runs scored); Bobby Richardson (181 base hits); Joe Pepitone (28 home runs, 100 RBI); Roger Maris (26 homers); Jim Bouton (18 wins); "Whitey" Ford (17-6 W/L record, 12 complete games); Al Downing (13 victories, 217 strikeouts).* As a team, the Yanks hit .253 and 162 home runs. The pitching staff's ERA was 3.15, third in the league.
