The Orioles took flight on a stretch of 22 calendar days from May 18th through June 8th during which they were sole owners of first place. They won 12 of 20 ballgames over that time. They then flipped around and made a hard landing by the end of the month, going 9-16 and ultimately falling out of contention, plopping into 6th place, 6 ½ games out. The closest the Birds came to first the rest of the season was right after that dismal June, winning eight of ten to move to third six full games behind...This young Orioles squadron had a smattering of ballplayers who would play a huge part in their becoming one of the best teams in baseball history. John Wesley "Boog" Powell, 21, was the team leader with 25 jacks and 82 RBI. Jim Gentile, 29, followed with 24 homers and 72 RBI. Brooks Robinson, the wizard with the glove at third base, popped 11 home runs while driving in 67, at the tender age of twenty-six. Veteran "Little Louie" Aparicio, 29, who was traded to Baltimore from the White Sox in exchange for four young prospects in January, won another Gold Glove and revved up the offense with his speed, leading the team with 150 base hits and tying the Dodgers Maury Wills for the most stolen bases in the big leagues...One of the original "Baby Birds" of the pitching staff, Steve Barber, 25, was a 20-game winner and an All Star. Another of his co-horts, Milt Pappas, 24, won 16 ballgames. Robin Roberts, 36, added a veteran's touch by claiming 14 wins. Twenty-year-old Dave McNally completed his first full year in the big show and picked up seven victories. Wally Bunker, 18, made his big league entrance with one start, September 29th, pitching four innings but giving up six runs to the Tigers in a loss...Pitcher Dick Hall's hitting prowess likely stems from his time as primarily an outfielder prior to toiling on the mound. He turned to pitching in 1955.
