The great Mickey Mantle became the major leagues' first \$100,000-a-year ballplayer in '63. Story has it, reaching that salary was one of his goals which led to him to never ask for another raise for the remainder of his career. "The Mick" played in just 65 ball games (52 in centerfield) after breaking an ankle--one of his myriad of injuries throughout his career. His spikes became caught in the chain-link fence at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium in an attempt to rob Brooks Robinson of a home run on June 5th. An All Star Team selection, Mantle could not play in the mid-summer classic due to the injury for the first time in his career. Mickey would hit 15 home runs and drive home 35 in 172 at bats. Catcher "Ellie" Howard became the first black ballplayer to win a league MVP Award after blasting 28 homers, driving home eighty-five, and playing impeccable defense behind the plate resulting in a Gold Glove Award as well. Howard led the ball club in homers and was followed by Joe Pepitone (27), Tom Tresh (25), and Roger Maris (23). Tresh was the leader with 91 runs scored; Bobby Richardson stroked the most base hits (167). Pepitone was high-man after knocking in 89 runs. The Yanks were second in the A. L. with a .252 batting average and 188 home runs..."Whitey" Ford topped the league in victories (24) and was third in MVP tallies. Ford led the pitching staff in strikeouts (189). Jim Bouton would not have another season like this one ever again: 21-7 W/L record, 12 complete games, and a staff high six shutouts. After '63, arm miseries derailed what looked to be a very strong talent on the mound. Ralph Terry posted 17 wins. The staff ERA (3.07) was second in the A. L. and they compiled the most complete games (59)... The L. A. Dodgers swept the Yankees in the World Series in four games, marking the beginning of the twilight to the team's long dynasty. In the Series, Mantle hit .133 with one homer; Ford would lose his two starts allowing seven runs in twelve innings of work. New York scored only four runs in the four games.
