Leave it to the Yankees to give their most passionate legion of fans high anxiety and hot dog heartburn on the way to the franchises possible 28th World Championship. Let's see how they got there: Those Birds from Baltimore got off to a fast start with the Yanks always hovering over-head. At the All Star break, New York was a game out in second place of the AL East. After playing .604 baseball in the first half (20 games over .500), the Orioles hitting tailed off while the Yankees took flight winning 36 games to the O's 33 in half #2. The New York pitching had a lot to do with that. Carlos Rodon (16 wins, 195 K's), American League Rookie of the Year Luis Gil (15 wins, 171 K's) and Luke Weaver, reborn as a top notch closer when one was most-needed, carried the ball club. Free agent Juan Soto was a Godsend with his 41 homers and 109 RBI. The effervescent Soto was complemented by the best player in the game, Aaron Judge, who was the A. L. MVP, leading the big leagues with the most home runs (58), the most RBI (144) and major league-best .458 OBP, .701 SLG average, 1.159 OPS. He had the third-best batting average. Giancarlo Stanton made a lot of noise, too, with 27 bombs over the fence and 72 RBI...The Yankees slugged their way through the post-season as well, overwhelming Kansas City three games to one in a league division series and Cleveland 4-1 for the American League Championship...It became the twelfth time the Yankees and Dodgers (including the latter's Brooklyn days) collided in the 120th Fall Classic. The highly anticipated showdown did not show the Yanks at their best. The Series opened in Los Angeles with the Dodgers winning Game One 6-3 in extra-innings after a walk-off grand slam home run by L. A.'s Freddie Freeman. Game Two was tied 1-1 until the Dodgers scored three runs in the bottom of the third, then held on to beat the Yankees, 4-2. Freeman hit his second homer of the Series. At Yankee Stadium for Game Three, the Yankees faced a sweep by Los Angeles, losing this one, 4-2. New York survived to play another day by winning Game Four, 11-4. Five runs in the eighth salted away the victory despite Freeman's third home run. Yankee stars Judge and Anthony Volpe both committed an error in Game Five's fifth inning, leading to five Dodger runs. New York DID lead the ballgame 6-5 after six innings; however, Los Angeles scored two more in the eighth. Two Dodger relievers combined to pitch 3.1 innings to save the game, leaving the Bombers stunned.
