A payload of highlights for the "Space City" crew to the pleasure of Astros fans and new skipper Joe Espada: Before he had cleared all the dust from the dugout's top step, Ronel Blanco had no-hit the Blue Jays in Houston, April 1st, for Espada's first major league victory. Blanco struck out seven and walked two to fashion the franchise's 17th no-no. The final score was 10-0...A fourth place, 5 ½ game deficit with a 17-25 start to the year was an unexpected curtain-raising for the defending AL West champs on May 14th. From there, the ball club found it's balance and started to quickly advance up the division's ladder. They went over .500 June 30th, then powered-up for the rest of the season, going 46-32 the remainder of the schedule. Along the way, the Astros won the franchise's 5,000th game, September 13th, MLB's second expansion team to do so. They claimed their seventh division crown in eight years, September 24th, defeating Seattle, 4-3, for Framber Valdez's 15th win of the season...With not enough W's, Houston did not earn a bye to start the playoffs. A Wild Card set with Detroit (best-of-three) saw the 'Stros season conclude in a snappy two games, both at Minute Maid Park...Valdez ended the campaign 15-7 with 169 K's. Blanco was 13-6 and led the pitchers with 179 punch-outs. Closer Josh Hader tied for the fifth-most saves in the majors while whiffing 105 opponents...The Astros potent bats launched 190 homers led by Yordan Alvarez's 35 jacks and 86 RBI. Three others hit 20 or more home runs: Alex Bregman (26), Kyle Tucker (23), and Jose Altuve (20). Altuve had a terrific season at 34, leading the team with 94 runs and 185 hits over 153 games played. His 224th career home run lifted him past one of the first well-celebrated Astros, "The Toy Cannon," Jimmy Wynn, for fourth place on the team's All Time list. Yainer Diaz's bat drove home 84 runs.
