After five straight seasons with a winning record, which included three visits to the post-season, some pundits believed the Blue Jays were ready to make the next step and possibly win the AL East. Of course, the Yankees and Orioles would have something to say about that. By June 21st, the Jays had slid to the bottom of the division and remained there the rest of the year. The ball club's bane was winning only 19 of 49 one-run games. Head-to-head against the Yanks and O's, the Blue Jays were 12-14. The team was never more than three games over .500, and that was in April...Slimmed-down Vlad Guerrero Jr. had an MVP-like season. He finished second in the big leagues in batting average and third with 199 base hits. No other teammate came close to his 30 home runs, 103 RBI, .940 OPS, and 44 doubles...Jose Berrios, Kevin Gausman, and Chris Bassitt won a combined 40 games. Berrios had the most wins (16)...Spark-plug Bo Bichette had to deal with a dismal season. His bat never came to life. Over the course of the year he was on the injured list three times, a total of 72 games. Four homers and 31 RBI were all he was able to produce... Approximately 23 players were stricken from the organization's rosters as the season wore on, 12 from the major league team...Former Reds linchpin Joey Votto, signed as a free agent in March, never played an inning with the Blue Jays and retired August 22nd. He had played 31 games in the minors.
