With Yadier Molina, Albert Pujols, Adam Wainwright and now Tyler O'Neill gone from the organization, the Cardinals seem to be at a cross-roads. Manager Oliver Marmol, despite his ball club finishing a disappointing 20 games under .500 in 2023, had his contract extended through the 2026 season. The Redbirds made a very promising start, attaining second place in the NL Central at the All Star break, 6 ½ games behind. That step-off may have been even better if Paul Goldschmidt hadn't struggled through a very agonizing and puzzling slow start at the plate. "Goldy" was hitting in the low .200s before finding his groove and recovered nicely to finish the year with 22 home runs and 65 RBI. Second year shortstop Masyn Winn, only 22, added a spark to the offense with 32 doubles, 15 homers, and 57 RBI while scoring the most runs on the team (85). From May 9th through the 30th, Winn rang-up and 18-game hitting streak. Alec Burleson was the leader with 78 RBI and followed Goldschmidt with 21 jacks. Willson Contreras spent less time behind the plate due to a fractured arm, but did a solid job as a designated hitter. He wound up clouting 15 home runs. Nolan Arenado was good for 16 homers with 71 RBI. The Cardinals brought back an old favorite, Matt Carpenter, to DH/pinch hit and former Giants shortstop Brandon Crawford to add depth to the bench. Crawford was released later in the year, possibly the terminus to a great career. Dylan Carlson was moved to the Tampa Bay Rays at the trade deadline...The pitching staff saw Sonny Gray produce the group's best numbers: 13 wins, 203 strikeouts. He began the year unscored upon and undefeated over three starts until April 21st. During that time his WHIP was below 1.00. Newcomer Kyle Gibson was an eight-game winner; veteran Miles Mikolas tallied ten victories. Closer Ryan Helsley led all big league relievers in saves. The relief corps was #1 with fifty-five...Thomas Saggese's last name is pronounced soo-JAY-see.
