The sky is the limit for Shohei Ohtani who signed a contract with the Dodgers for 10 years and \$700 million. One can't find enough superlatives to describe this man. He led the big leagues in runs scored (134) and finished behind just a few (mainly Aaron Judge) in other categories. The National League's premier player was unanimously voted MVP. He was #1 in the N. L. with 54 homers, 130 RBI, and a slash .390 OBP, .646 slugging percentage, and 1.036 OPS. His stolen base count was second to the Reds Elly De La Cruz. Ohtani was assisted by newcomer Teoscar Hernandez who carried a dominant stick of his own: 33 HRs and 99 RBI. "Mookie" Betts, who began the season as the starting shortstop, returned to rightfield as Miguel Rojas and Tommy Edman shared the position when the latter returned from the injured list. Betts hit 19 home runs and drove in 75. Freddie Freeman was his usual consistent self, adding 22 jacks and 89 RBI. Twenty-five-year old Gavin Stone threw the most innings and posted the most wins (11). Tyler Glasnow (9-6) struck out 168 batters. Starter Jack Flaherty, acquired from Detroit at the trade deadline, added a crucial six wins. The Dodger juggernaut ran the table in first place all 162 games and into the playoffs. A highly anticipated NLDS against arch-rival San Diego gave L. A. the most trouble. Los Angeles won the best-of-five three games to two with two shutouts. The Cinderella Mets made it to the NLCS, which the Dodgers had little difficulty winning, 4-2. L. A. turned the Yankees inside-out in the World Series, conquering their former New York counterparts in five games for their 8th Fall Classic victory, the 12th match-up versus the Bronx Bombers.
