March had been completed when the Rockies took the ignominious foothold on the bottom of the NL West Division. They won seven fewer games (27) in the second half of the season. This franchise hasn’t had a year with an over-.500 record since 2018; likewise, it was their second straight 100-plus loss campaign. Against division teams, the Rockies were 18-34...Manager “Bud” Black had to agonizingly observe his pitching staff end the season with the worst ERA in the big leagues (5.47) along with the most runs allowed (929) and base hits (1,604). Cal Quantrill won the most ballgames (8) while Ryan Feltner struck out the most opponents (138)...The Rockies hit a middle-of-the-road .242 and 179 homers. The team’s best player, Ezequiel Tovar, led the N. L. with 45 doubles and the Colorado offense with 78 RBI and 26 homers. Youngster Brenton Doyle was a bright light, earning a Gold Glove and hitting 23 jacks with 72 RBI. Michael Toglia swung a potent bat, powerful enough to crack 25 home runs and drive home 55 mates. Charlie Blackmon, a long-time fixture in right field and consistently productive at bat (lifetime .293 BA, 227 home runs, 801 RBI), announced he and his long beard were calling it a career at the end of the season. He played all of his 14 years as a Rockie, was an All Star four times, and a National League batting champion (.331) in 2017.
