Skipper Gene Mauch took the Angels on a good run all season after sprinting out of the blocks through April and May. The latter month ended with the ball club in first place of the A. L. West at 31-18, holding a 1 ½ game lead. The Halos still claimed the top spot at the All Star recess by one full game over their closest pursuers most of the season, the Royals and White Sox. At August's end, the Angels had dropped to second only 1 ½ games behind despite a very good 17-12 record. (Kansas City was 21-11 that month to grab the lead.) After sweeping a 3-game series from the Royals at the "Big A" 20-22 September, the Angels took back first place, headed for the promised land. Their final margin was three games over Kansas City...California quickly won the first two games of the ALCS at home over the Milwaukee Brewers with the strength of Tommy John's and Bruce Kison's mound work. In Milwaukee, the Brew Crew snatched Games 3 and 4, outscoring the Halos 14-8. With 6 ½ innings in the books of decisive Game Five at County Stadium and a 3-2 Angels lead, the Brewers scored two runs in the bottom of the seventh with three hits and a walk. California was held to only two hits and zero runs the rest of the ballgame, ending their season...John (Yankees) was one of several players obtained in trades or signed as free agents who were vital cogs for the Angels. In December 1981, the Phillies sold catcher Bob Boone to California, Tim Foli (Pittsburgh) and Doug DeCinces (Baltimore) came over in trades, while Reggie Jackson signed on as a free agent from the Yankees, January '82. John had been acquired at the trade deadline for the stretch run...Mauch's ball club got solid hitting and great pitching all season long. The Angels' 186 home runs were second in the A. L. topped by newcomers Jackson (39) and DeCinces (30). Brian Downing walloped 28 round-trippers; Don Baylor added 24 and Fred Lynn 21. Jackson had the team's most RBI (101). DeCinces finished second to Reggie with 97...Geoff Zahn paced the mound staff with 18 wins. Starters Ken Forsch and Steve Renko posted 13 and 11 wins, respectively. Spot starter Bruce Kison won 10 ballgames. Their 3.82 ERA was the league's second-best...The Angels turned 171 double plays placing them fourth behind the Brewers, White Sox, and Red Sox in the majors...Lynn was the ALCS MVP with an eye-popping .611 batting average (11 for 18). Baylor drove home ten runs, Lynn five.
