The Blue Jays and new manager Bobby Cox posted the franchise's best record since the American League expansion of 1977. The ball club never challenged for a playoff spot, but nevertheless, there were some individual performances serving as a precursor of future success. Top starter Dave Stieb, 24, won 17 ballgames and led the majors with 19 complete games, hurling 5 shutouts. His WHIP, 1.20, and pitching excellence, helped him garner enough votes to place fourth in Cy Young Award voting. Jim Clancy, 26, a member of the pitching staff since the team's inaugural season, won 16 ballgames and was named to the All Star team...Offensively, the Jays batted .262 as a team with Willie Upshaw leading the way with 21 homers and 75 RBI. Twenty-two-year old cannon-armed Jesse Barfield won the job as the regular rightfielder. He finished behind Upshaw with 18 home runs and 58 RBI. Damaso Garcia came in second with 54 stolen bases to Rickey Henderson's breathtaking 130 swipes. He was sixth in the big leagues in batting average as well as base hits (185) of which 145 were singles. Two other speed merchants, Lloyd Moseby (9) and Alfredo Griffin (8), ended the year among batters with the most triples...**STEP UP TO THE COUNTER:** Banned by the Canadian government from selling beer at the ballpark, the legislators finally consented, on a trial condition (?), to allow the beverage to be served July 7<sup>th</sup>. The first brew was sold officially at Exhibition Stadium, July 30<sup>th</sup>, a happy day for many of the 18,262 paying customers who witnessed a 6-5 twelve inning walk-off victory over Detroit. Rance Mulliniks provided the winning bingle with one out. *Cheers eh!*
