**"Brew Crew" Headliners:** Milwaukee finished no lower than third for the fifth time since 1977 and wound up the year first for the second straight season in the AL East. (They won the division with the best combined record of a strike-shortened 1981 campaign.)...Robin Yount drove in six runs in a game against the Orioles, September 24<sup>th</sup> ... The stellar shortstop also became the first player at that position in MLB history to lead his league in slugging percentage (.578). In addition, Yount led the majors in base hits (210), OPS (.957), and total bases (367). He tied the Royals Hal McRae for the most doubles (46). The American League MVP finished second in the big leagues in batting average and runs scored (129)...Paul Molitor's 136 runs scored topped the big leagues while "Stormin' Gorman" Thomas tied the Angels Reggie Jackson for the major league lead in home runs (39)...Cecil Cooper blasted 32 jacks and led the ball club with 121 RBI. Both Molitor and Cooper posted over 200 hits. Ben Oglivie contributed 34 home runs and 102 RBI; Ted Simmons cracked 23 HR and drove in 97. American League Cy Young Award winner Pete Vuckovich won 18 ballgames and struck out 105 to pace the pitching staff. Mike Caldwell won 17 ballgames and completed 12 contests...Disenchanted with team's 23-24 record on June 1<sup>st</sup>, the front office replaced manager "Buck" Rodgers with hitting coach Harvey Kuenn. Under Kuenn, the Brewers won 72 ballgames and would lead the league with 216 homers to earn the nickname "Harvey's Wallbangers". The team batting average (.279) was second as well as their 277 doubles...At this time, the ALCS was a best three-out-of-five affair. The AL West champion Angels won the first two games at "The Big A" before the Brewers came charging back to sweep the last three to win the series. Pete Ladd saved two ballgames; Charlie Moore hit .462 and Molitor hit to the tune of .316 with two homers and five RBI...For baseball fans, the World Series versus the St. Louis Cardinals was a great way to cap off a year where the word "strike" could be confidently dropped from one's vocabulary. Over the first five games, the Series went back and forth. The Cardinals broke through with a huge 13-1 victory in Game Six to tie the Fall Classic, but the Brewers, after leading 3-1 going to the last of the sixth of Game Seven, couldn't hold on as St. Louis scored five unanswered runs with a barrage of seven hits off five Milwaukee pitchers in the last three innings. The 6-3 final ended the Series in favor of the Cardinals.
