The closest the Buccos came to first place of the NL East (2 ¼ games) was July 15<sup>th</sup> after a 5-1 win at Houston. Pittsburgh managed to hang around the division leaders for most of the year; however, they could never break through to seriously challenge the pace-setters. One always expects to see the Pirates at the top of the league in hitting. This season was no different. A .273 team average ranked them #1. They were also #1 in hits (1,535), doubles (272), slugging (.408), and OPS (.734). Bill Madlock ended the year among the top five in the majors with a .319 batting average. Jason Thompson was the team leader in home runs (31) and RBI (101). A strong and lean centerfielder, mercurial Omar Moreno finished among baseball's best with nine triples and a remarkable stolen base total (4<sup>th</sup> place). Johnny Ray garnered the second-most votes for Rookie of the Year...John Candelaria's ERA was fourth-best in the majors, his WHIP (1.162) was tenth. "The Candy Man," twelve wins, was second on the pitching staff to Don Robinson's fifteen. Closer Kent Tekulve was called the winning pitcher twelve times...Captain Willie Stargell, 42, hobbled by painful knees and primarily a pinch-hitter, drove three homers out-of-the-park to go with 17 RBI. "The Cobra," Dave Parker, appeared in 73 games and lacked some of his sting. He added six home runs and 29 RBI to the offense.
