Following the 1981 season, the Reds front office decided to conduct a significant turnover of the ball club, none of which really panned out. First, Ken Griffey, Sr. was traded to the Yankees in November. Next, they acquired bench player Clint Hurdle from Kansas City. Ray Knight went to Houston for Cesar Cedenno, while in January 1982, pitcher Paul Moskau was dealt to Baltimore for a player-to-be-named later: infielder Wayne Krenchicki. In early February, George Foster was dispatched to the Mets for three players, one of whom became starting catcher Alex Trevino. As a side-note, future closer Randy Myers was drafted in the third round of the amateur draft but decided not to sign with the Reds...The best the team could do was reach one game over .500 on April 9th, the season's third game. The ball club went on to finish last for the first time since 1937--the first 100-loss year in franchise annals--and with a losing record since 1971. John McNamara, dismissed with a 34-58 mark in July, was succeeded by Russ Nixon, then the first base coach...Dan Driessen was the leader with a meager 17 homers and tied Cedenno with 57 RBI. Johnny Bench followed with 13 jacks, relegated to third base duties for his second-to-last season...Twenty-five-year old Mario Soto's 14 wins and 274 strikeouts by far led the pitching staff. He turned in the major leagues' best WHIP (1.060). Tom Seaver, 37, ended the year 5-13, striking out 62.
