The first half of the season, the Astros were THE team in the AL West. Winning series after series, they reached the All Star break in first by five games. It was very odd seeing one of the best players in franchise history, Jose Altuve, starting the year in leftfield following a spring training experiment. He sometimes looked lost at his new position, eventually returning to second base to shore up the defense. The same idea had come with his move to the outfield to get better infield defense. The second half would not go nearly as well. With three prime players out with injuries, starter Framber Valdez, Jake Meyers and Isaac Paredes, the Astros traded for former star Carlos Correa and slick-fielding Ramon Urias in trade deadline acquisitions. Youngster and All Star Jeremy Pena patrolled shortstop, leading to Correa agreeing to switch to third to replace Paredes. The move clicked, but the Astros did not play winning baseball through August and September. A prior season high seven game lead began to quickly evaporate. Atop the division at the end of August, the Astros slipped to second for three days mid-September. Regaining first on the 17th, things looked okay. However, from the 19th through the 28th, they won three of the final nine games as the Dodgers sprinted past, resulting in no post-season for the first time since 2017...Newcomer Christian Walker led the team with 27 homers and 88 RBI. Altuve never lost a beat at the plate, adding 26 home runs and 77 RBI...The top two starters, Valdez and Hunter Brown, combined for 25 wins. Brown struck out 206 batters, finishing third in AL Cy Young Award voting.
