The Blue Jays gave the arch-rival Yankees a run for their money in the AL East. Other than April (11-14), the Jays posted winning records each month the rest of the year. A sharp 55-41 mark and a two-game lead over New York was attained by the All Star break. The Yanks were better in the second half, winning 45 of 66 games as the Blue Jays won 39 of 66. The race came down to the season's last day. Toronto closed with a win over Tampa Bay while the Yankees won their season finale over Baltimore. The final standings showed a dead tie for first. A tie-breaker, favoring the Jays after beating New York in their season series, 8-5, sent the team into the playoffs with a Wild Card round bye. The Jays defeated the Yanks three more times in an ALDS, thrusting them into the ALCS with the Mariners in the opposing dugout. The teams split the first four games, but the Blue Jays won two of the last three to win the series, 4-3. The Dodgers were the opposition in the Jays first World Series appearance since 1993, the year Joe Carter's walk-off homer sank the Phillies. Los Angeles fielded another juggernaut, but the Jays played them to a 2-2 tie after four. Toronto jumped ahead, 3-2; however, back on their home turf for the last two, L. A. won the final two games, the finale in 11 innings as the Dodgers Will Smith hit a two-run homer for the decisive runs...Toronto could mash the baseball, topping the majors in batting average (.265). To lead the offense, George Springer enjoyed a nice come-back season with 32 home runs and 84 RBI. It had been 19/56 in 2024. He raised his batting average almost 100 points...Two veteran starters, Chris Bassitt (11 wins) and Kevin Gausman (10) had solid seasons. Jeff Hoffman finished fourth in the majors in saves. Youngster Trey Yesavage joined the ball club late in the year, winning one game in the World Series and striking out 17 in 12.2 innings.
