What has become of the Nationals? Since their World Championship season in 2019, they have plunged to the nether reaches (the bottom) of the NL East Division. Since 2019, the Nats have finished last in five of the past six seasons (fourth in 2024). The duo of Mike Rizzo (GM) and field manager Dave Martinez was finally tossed to the wind in early July. Under Martinez, the Nationals were 37-53 before being relieved of his duties. Bench coach Miguel Cairo took over in the interim, fairing no better. What really hurt were the 19 runs allowed to the Mets in April and an 11-game losing skein in June. They had one positive month all season: 15-12 in May...For a team that hit .242, the leader was 22-year old James Wood, producer of 31 homers, 94 RBI, and a slash of .350/.475/.825. Ignominiously, he led the majors with 221 strikeouts. A bright spot was another youngster, Daylen Lile, who popped 9 home runs and 11 triples in 91 games. Defensively, centerfielder Jacob Young was superb...The pitching staff was a literal disaster--it allowed 899 runs and 214 homers. Two nine-game winners led the staff: Jake Irvin and Mitchell Parker. On the flip side, Mitchell lost 16 ballgames, MacKenzie Gore 15.
